It is encouraging to have things to look forward to in the life of the church, in particular the Church Weekend Away to Lee Abbey, and plans for a 'PCC Away Day' in the autumn to give space for God to speak to us and for reflection on where we feel called as a church. These challenges can feel like they stretch us and are heavy loads to bear, and so my prayer is that we will continually hold only to 'the burden that is light' and find rest in Jesus (Matthew 11). As we live and worship alongside each other, serving God and sharing his love with those around us, I pray we will learn from Jesus together and grow closer to God in all we do.

St Stephens church office

Over 2022 the church office settled into a regular pattern of opening three mornings a week. The church telephone connection and voicemail are restored, and emails responded to promptly. Rotas are produced and a monthly bulletin, which is also available on the church website. Bookings for use of the church building are co-ordinated in the church diary, dates arranged for routine maintenance and occasional visitors. Records are kept and returns made to the Diocese. And there are a host of other tasks, great and small.

Up to the summer the office was run by volunteer Gill O'Rourke, who was able to come with experience of running another church office. From September our own Alison Prince took up the post as a permanent administrator. As well as organisational skills and commitment to the church she also has the advantage of being well known within the church family at St Stephen's. Gill continued to offer training and support as Ali took on board the many aspects involved.

The church office is often the first point of contact with those outside the church, and a key place for communications amongst the church family at St Stephen's, covering a multitude of tasks to help the church keep going from week to week and through the year. The administrator needs to know what is going on, and often able to 'join up the dots' when different people are making their various contributions to the life of the church and upkeep of the building. She doesn't necessarily make the decisions - often matters are passed on to appropriate others - but it is helpful to be included in communications, to know what is going on and to make sure things are carried through. Friendly faces are very welcome, though sometimes there's a need to be left in peace to get on with something that needs to be finished in the time available! And when Ali's not 'in the office', particularly on Sunday, remember she's not at work, and please keep anything related to church organisation until office hours.

It is so encouraging to have the support and prayers of such a willing church community, all those who play their part in the life of the body of Christ here.

The prayer chain is a small number of people that receive confidential emails of requests for prayer.


In the last year we have prayed for many things in particular healing we have had many operations in our congregation and beyond.

Kintsugi Hope



This is a course about disappointment, loss, anxiety, anger, perfectionism, shame, and resilience.

During 2022 we held a second Kintsugi Hope course, led by Clarie Miles following the success of the first one the previous autumn. Out of that Andie Fowler & John Gardner have trained and started a new Kintsugi Hope group for 2023.

Bible Study

There are about 12 of us who meet from time to time for Bible study on Monday afternoons - although on any one week the number is usually about 6!

During the year we have used the Prayer Course with online videos and questions to look at what prayer is and the many ways of praying.

We interspersed this during Lent with the Archbishop of Canterbury's recommended book and study called Embracing Justice', again using the online resources of videos and questions.

In the Autumn we changed gear and studied the letter of Paul to the Philippians. We referred to the book

of Acts and thought about the background to the letter, but generally used the method of reading the passage several times, having time in silence to reflect and then shared the things that had spoken to each of us individually.

We are now embarking on a study of the book of Ruth in the Old Testament, relating it to the issues of bereavement, poverty and migration in our lives and world today. Each time we meet we pray together, often sharing things in our own lives we need prayer for and praying for others in church and for problems in the wider world. We welcome anyone to come and join us at any time.

Children and Families work

Hello! I'm Trenna the Children and Families worker here at St Stephen's Church. I am employed to oversee and coordinate Sunday morning provision for 0-10yr old's, Kids Matter and Babies Matter parenting programmes, Toddler group on Monday mornings and networking in the community.

This does not mean I do this all on my own, there are teams behind each aspect of the work, and of that I am grateful. I love to think of ways in which community can be built and some of the things that follow below, speak of community building and they certainly could not have happened without the teams and willingness of volunteers to be involved and plot and plan. If you have any ideas that would continue to build community and deepen our faith in Jesus, amongst the families of the church, and wider community - please come and find me and let's plan some fun things for 2023!

On **Sunday mornings** we continue to provide Creation Station on the 2nd Sunday of the month and Cinema Sunday on the 4th Sunday.

We have a lively and chatty group of up to twelve 3–10-year-olds. It's been a year of keeping going, welcoming, and building relationships with the children and families.

Going forward, I pray that the relationships we build and the faith we share on Sunday mornings will help our children to search for God, to find God, and to know Jesus as part of their everyday life.

The community enjoyed a **Light Party** on a very wet Halloween night! It was a very welcome dry space - even the local PCSO took shelter.

Lots of toddler group families, and all ages from church came together, for craft, hot dogs, story, and dancing. We even managed to toast marshmallows over a fire pit and have sparklers in the pouring rain! This was such a great example of our church community pulling together to make something quality happen to share the light and hope we have in Jesus.

Babies Matter ran its first programme starting in October with 3 parents. What a joy to walk alongside these new parents and their babies, and see them grow and develop, celebrate together, some of "the firsts" and talk about taking care of our self, our parenting team, and our baby. Some of these parents have now connected consistently with our Toddler group, so reducing isolation and building support networks. One parent said

"Babies Matter has helped me to understand my baby better, it's helped me in my relationship with my partner, and has helped me understand things in the crazy world that is becoming a new mum"

Kids Matter ran, and completed, two programmes in 2022, supporting 8 families with a total of 21 children between them. Badocks Wood Primary Academy was where we held one programme and another at the Greenway Centre.



This was born out of an exciting partnership with Mud Pies Forest School and Children and Young People's Social Prescribing in Southmead. Please be praying for us as we continue to make community connections, with the local primary schools. We would love to see the schools invite us in to facilitate a programme. In 2023 we hope to welcome a new facilitator onto the team and would love to see the team grow and strengthen so we can reach more families in Southmead and support them in their parenting journey.

Toddlers grew over the year, regularly welcoming 15 families each week. The increased use of space to include the back of church as well as the St Stephen's room, provided more space for the energy that 20 under 5's brings! We held 2 events as specific outreach events for toddlers. The first, a **Clothes swap** - a



social time in the evening, with twinkly lights and refreshments without our children, to build relationship and enjoy each other's company. One parent said, "I haven't laughed so much in a long time". The second was an evening to make a **Christmas Wreath.** 40 women (and a few children and men too) surrounded by greenery, ribbon, berries, and mulled wine, were launched into the Christmas spirit. It was special to see women from other churches in Southmead, Kids Matter families, Toddler group families, and friends, and even a few women came just because they saw it advertised and didn't have any connection with St Stephens and have since come along to toddlers on a Monday morning.

As we continue to build networks and relationships in the community of Southmead, a partnership with the Community Church that meets at the Greenway Centre, saw a **Good Friday fun morning** take place at the Ranch over 200 families from the community to take part in a trail that told the Easter Story, alongside crafts and of course an easter egg and a hot cross bun or two!

I can't end this report without saying how grateful I am to the teams and volunteers, who put in many hours behind the scenes and at each event and group that takes place.

The listening, the sharing, the laughter, the tears, and the praying - this is what makes working with the families and children at St Stephen's and Southmead so exciting and I am looking forward to all that 2023 brings.

Building Maintenance

During 2022 we tackled numerous outstanding jobs around the church building, overseen by a small group of people forming our 'building team', and we held several Saturday in-house DIY and cleaning sessions, open to everyone, to tackle some of the issues. As well as making real progress, within our capabilities, we also enjoyed fellowship and lunches together. Please come and join in next time we hold a church community workday! Here is a summary of what was done over the year, with thanks to Michael Shields for his meticulous record-keeping.

Electrical inspection of the building has been completed, including P.A.T. testing of all necessary appliances. Electrical safety has thus been managed.

A Fire Risk Assessment has been carried out and additional fire extinguishers added, including the replacement of others.

All the functioning wall heaters in use within the Church have been cleaned and serviced.

Lighting: in the main Church area has been serviced and balanced lighting has now been restored. Ceiling lights in the corridor leading to the rear toilet and Vestry have been replaced with new fittings

offering better illumination. (LED type). Lights in the Church Foyer has been restored. (LED type). In the St. Stephen's Room and Choir Vestry bulbs have been replaced with a modern LED type and the rooms are much brighter now.

Hot water heaters were installed in both toilets and the kitchen sink area was fitted with new taps, allowing a much more user-friendly experience, and the water heater serviced.

A new Church sign board was constructed and fitted to the outside wall, to the right of the main outer door entrance.

The Administration Office area at the rear of the Lady Chapel had its phone line switched to a digital service and a second extension handset installed. Internet access is still needing improvement. This is an important communication hub, within the Church and outside it.

An asbestos survey of our Church building was carried out and no further action is necessary.

Broken windowpanes in the main Church area were replaced by a glazier, and the church gutters have been cleared of obstructions by an outside contractor. Damaged and missing roofing tiles remained in need of attention (now due to be replaced during May 2023).

Repairing to the church bell clapper and rope pull mechanism is in progress. The big project concerning the repair or replacement of the Church clock in the tower is on-going. Funding raising continues. Watch this space!

Ongoing projects: The Green Team: Church Garden Fence project to install perimeter railings and gating around all our garden, to create a safe area for young children, continues. The permission of the Consistory Court is needed, also for removal and disposing of unwanted pews. A Faculty Application has been submitted covering both and further professional input is being obtained.
